Mural Mom

Arlene Sullivan, executive director of Changing Images Art Foundation, was inspired after she spent two months in the NICU when her son was born. "There's nothing to look at," says Sullivan, an art teacher and Towaco native. "Hospitals have to be sterile, but sterile-looking walls can drive you crazy." In 1997, Sullivan partnered with another mom to create colorful murals to hang in local hospitals. Staff, patients, volunteers, and even celebrities have filled in her outlines with nontoxic paint to create striking, cheerful works of art. "This is my way of saying thank you for my children's health," says Sullivan, whose paintings now number in the thousands (and counting) in NJ and around the world.
